BIGGEST CHALLENGE: When Bearak was officially sworn in as President of the Queens Civic Congress on October 15, he replaced Sean Walsh, who served as the organization's presence for its first 10 years. He said that replacing someone who has been in the position for such a long time would be challenging, but he was also confident in his own style of leadership.
